What is REDD?

REDD = Reducing Emissions from Deforestation & Forest Degradation (in Developing Countries)

- •<u>Incentives to be provided to developing</u>
 countries to slow down rates of deforestation
 and forest degradation to reduce GHG
 emissions.
- •<u>Industrialized countries to make financial</u> transfers to developing countries to compensate them for costs of avoiding deforestation.

Why is REDD important?

•Since deforestation results in ~20% of global greenhouse gas emissions, we can't prevent global temperature increases from going above 2 degrees C without slowing deforestation and forest degradation.





What is the UN-REDD Programme?

A partnership of FAO, UNDP & UNEP to:

- 1.Assist developing countries with capacity development, governance, and technical needs for effective participation in REDD
- 2. Support dialogue and build consensus for agreed methodologies for REDD on:
- -Monitoring, Reporting, Verification
- -Stakeholder Engagement
- -Multiple Benefits (livelihoods & BD)
- -Benefit Sharing
- -Payment Mechanisms

Issues on REDD raised by Indigenous Peoples

- Need for access to more information
- Uncertainty around mechanisms for IP inclusion
- Fear of further marginalization (e.g. biofuels, little benefit from CDM)
- Cultural disconnect around monetization of nature
- Skepticism around market mechanism incentives
- Need for consideration of compensation for past and ongoing protection of forests









UN Mandate to Engage with IPs

- Participation and inclusion are <u>human rights principles</u> reflected in the "UN Common Understanding on the Human Rights Based Approach to Development Cooperation"
- UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, i.e. Articles 32, 41 & 42
- UNDG Guidelines on Indigenous Peoples' Issues
- UNDP & Indigenous Peoples: Policy of Engagement





UN Mandate to Engage with IPs

UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples

Article 32: ... States shall consult...in good faith with the Indigenous Peoples concerned through their <u>free and informed consent prior</u> to the approval of any project affecting their lands or territories and other resources...

Article 41: ...[The] agencies of the <u>United</u>
Nations system and other intergovernmental organizations <u>shall contribute to the full</u>
realization of the provisions of this <u>Declaration</u>
... Ways and means of <u>ensuring participation</u>
of indigenous peoples on issues affecting them shall be established.

Article 42: ...[The UN] specialized agencies, including at the country level, and States shall promote respect for and full application of the provisions of this Declaration and follow up the effectiveness of this Declaration.






'Operational Guidance' on Indigenous Peoples & Other Forest Dependent Communities

Intended to inform the design, implementation, monitoring & evaluation of UN-REDD Programme activities at global & national levels

It has 3 main parts:

- 1. <u>Principles</u> to guide UN-REDD activities
- 2. <u>Operational Guidelines</u> to tell us what we must <u>do</u> in UN-REDD activities
- 3. <u>Best Practice</u> to share experience on how best to undertake consultations










Principles for IP Engagement

... should guide UN-REDD Programme activities that may impact the rights of Indigenous Peoples and other Forest Dependent Communities.

- 1. Programme activities must follow a <u>human rights based approach</u> and must adhere to the <u>United Nations Declaration</u> on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.
- 2. Free, prior, and informed consent must be adhered to, and is essential to ensuring the full and effective participation of IPs in Programme activities.
- 3. The Programme must ensure that there is broad representation of Indigenous Peoples, including women and youth, at all stages of its activities.





Operational Guidelines for IP Engagement

Representation

- IPs on Policy Board & National Committees
- Independent Civil Society Advisory Group

<u>Transparency & Access to Information</u>

- Access to reports & official documents
- Primers & guidance for IPs on REDD
- Participation in relevant IP-led conferences
- Consultation documents co-developed with IPs
- Distribution of annual reports to IP networks

Participation & Inclusion

- Fora for IP perspectives in REDD dialogue
- National participation & engagement strategy
- Activities & budget allocations in national programs
- Assessment of activity impact on IP rights

Accountability & Recourse

Concerns & complaints to be addressed through Secretariat and Resident Coordinator






UN-REDD Programme Governance

- Policy Board: the decisionmaking body made up of participating countries, donors, civil society, UN agencies & Observers
- Policy Board decisions made by <u>consensus</u> among members
- Informed by Independent <u>Civil</u> <u>Society Advisory Group</u>
- <u>Secretariat</u> to ensure programme implementation, staffed by UN agencies









UN-REDD Programme Governance

1st Policy Board Meeting: 8–10 March 2009, Panama

Decisions Taken:

- Agrees to <u>full membership of IP rep</u> and invites Chair of UN Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues to serve
- In addition, invites self-selection of 3 IP Observers to Policy Board
- Invites <u>CSO full member</u> on Board and <u>3 CSO Observers</u> too
- Recognizes 'Guidance' and requests implementation and further consultation


